He has served on the board of directors of the Indiana Association of County Commissioners and has previously served on the board of directors of the AIC. He holds a Bachelor's Degree from Wittenberg University, and a Master's Degree from Indiana University and the University of Kent at Canterbury. He has also completed the Indiana Agricultural Leadership Program.
